2. Freedom For The Stallion (by Allen Toussaint) 5:00 By the beloved New Orleans pianist and composer Allen Toussaint (1938-2015).

3. Blues For Richard Folsom (by John Creger) 2:23

Composed in 1971 by guitarist and vocalist John Creger, and dedicated to a friend of his who tragically died young. When John sent this song to me in 1974 I knew I had to do something with it, and finally after many years I figured out how I wanted to arrange it, using the technique of muting the strings of the piano with the left hand as close to me as possible, while playing the piano keys with the right hand. John's piece is a continuation of the tradition of medium tempo eight measure Blues (or sixteen measures if counting faster), with each verse often having its own separate concise yet, as here, profound short story.

Some of the most notable versions of this kind of Blues are See See Rider by Mississippi John Hurt and many others, Crow Jane Blues by Skip James, Carl Martin and manyothers, Leroy Carr's How Long How Long Blues, Stack O'Lee (aka Stack O'Lee Blues, Stackolee, or Stagger Lee) by many artists, Sitting OnTop of the World by the Mississippi Sheiks, Come On in My Kitchen by Robert Johnson; and the New Orleans Blues songs Junker's Blues, Tee-Nah-Nah and Professor Longhair's Tipitina and Baby Let Me HoldYour Hand.

Inspired by the forests and lakes from Arlington, Washington, through Twisp, Washington, through Spokane, Washington, through northern Idaho, through western Montana to the emergence of the Great Plains in central Montana; then again from western Minnesota through northern Wisconsin. *Kai* means water in the Hawaiian language. And there is more *kaona* (deeper meanings) in the song.
