1. New Orleans Shall Rise Again # 7 [Are the Levees Shored Up In America? (George Winston/Henry Butler)



The last section of this song is from Henry Butler's playing, based on a figure I heard him play live.

2. Pixie # 6 in E Minor [Gobajie] (George Winston)

Inspired by the playing of the great James Booker (1939-1983). Also inspired by Gobajie, Ashlyn Gobajie, Caitlin Rose, Kalei, Shannagh, and Jamison Clarence. I recorded James Booker's Pixie [#1 in Eb] and also the song Pixie #3 In F# on GULF COAST BLUES & IMPRESSIONS-A HURRICANE RELIEF BENEFIT, and I also have more Pixies inspired by James Booker's playing and Gobajie, that have emerged and will be on the future recordings GULF COAST BLUES AND IMPRESSIONS 3 & 4. The songs I call Pixie are basically medium tempo blues progressions, with the left hand staying towards the middle of the keyboard, as is the case in James Booker's Pixie.
